Welcome New & Returning NAU Theatre Students!

The faculty, staff and I are very excited to see you very soon. We know it is earlier that you had planned, but hopefully that will help us to have a smooth semester. We are also very excited about meeting all the new faces and getting to know you.

This letter outlines important information for the semester ahead. There is new information for all, including returning students as we re-open campus as well as information that is directed toward our incoming students. I have divided the letter into INFORMATION FOR NEW STUDENTS and INFORMATION FOR ALL to help you navigate the letter. ## INFORMATION FOR NEW STUDENTS

We are excited that you will be joining us for challenging and rewarding theatrical experiences, where we hope you will grow and flourish as a student of Theatre. I would like to share our mission with you so you can better understand the focus of the NAU Theatre program:

NAU Theatre engages tomorrow's theatre ARTISTS and professionals in a deep, and broad understanding of theatre by focusing on experiential, and collaborative undergraduate learning. We cultivate our student's artistic integrity and work-ethic through a liberal arts foundation. Perhaps our vision makes it clearer: NAU Theatre envisions a nationally recognized undergraduate program in which our students excel as well-rounded theatre practitioners. We are committed to the students, the university, and the community through the transformative power of Theatre.

Over the coming academic year, remember our tag line, "We learn theatre by doing theatre" (#DoingTheatre) as we ask you to participate fully in your education. Later in this document, under INFORMATION FOR ALL you will find information regarding our season, audition dates

for the productions and other details that will help you to get involved immediately.

The following is information known to returning students, but will be good for you to know as you begin your NAU Theatre journey:

## **Crewing Shows:**

For those of you who are interested in working on the shows either as a crew member or in the shop, you will have the opportunity through your TH 123: Stagecraft, TH 122: Lighting and Sound or TH 124: Costume Construction courses and the TH 113: Production Practicum applied courses which fulfill lab hours in one of the shops and backstage. If you are enrolled in technical courses, you will learn all about the labs and crewing, as well as working in the shops during your regular class meeting. For the TH 113 lab course, the meeting time noted in your schedule is all day, that is because you will be working with your instructor to create a schedule of times to attend as well as a production to crew. All this will be made clear by your instructor of either TH 122, 123, or 124.

If you are not enrolled in a theatre technology course (TH 122, 123, 124) we encourage students to gain experience by volunteering for a crew or for work in the shop even if they are not in a TH 113 lab class. You will have the opportunity to meet the designers and technical staff (Nancy Parr, Kate Ellis, Jennifer Peterson, Ben Alexander, and Mark De Lancey) either at the Majors/Minors Meeting or when classes begin. Remember, our *virtual doors* (email and virtual meetings) are open and once we are through this pandemic, our actual doors will be open. In the meantime, please reach out via email to set up meetings, even if just to say hello!

## Mandatory Majors/Minor Meeting

During the first few days of the fall semester, you must attend a mandatory Majors/Minor Meeting (Thursday, August 13, 2020 at 5:30p.m. until 6:30 p.m.) where you will have the opportunity to hear about the department and meet faculty and students. Here is the login information:

## Where Do I Find Information for the Department?

The NAU Department of Theatre is a busy department on campus and students are very much involved in the inner workings of the unit. It can be challenging to stay on top of everything and to know what is going on. Luckily, you will have many options for finding information.

## The Department Call Board is your first stop...

In the Theatre hallway (located in The Performing and Fine Arts building #37) you will find the most important communication center for your four years at NAU. This is where the Callboard is located. The Callboard (located adjacent to the costume shop) is the control center for the department. You will find audition notices, daily schedules for rehearsals and production meetings, work calls, social events, and other pertinent information. Go to that board at least 2 times a day!

## Other Sources of Information:

Additionally, you will find a bulletin board directly across from the Theatre offices and next to Room 125 where outside auditions, school information, graduate programs, and job announcements are posted. Both the Callboard and the department board should be checked at least once-a-day to stay informed. Make it a habit by adding it to your routine as you pass by for a class that way you will not have to remember each day.

**AUDITION REQUIREMENTS:** All students interested in performance, and all freshmen and recent transfers, are <u>required</u> to audition for our mainstage productions.

So, what do you need to prepare for the auditions?

- Read the plays and prepare for the audition thoroughly, which means practice!
- What we find important in an audition is that the student actor is prepared and memorized. We like to see that you cared enough to prepare in advance.
- We are also looking for actors that are willing to take a risk or make specific choices, and that you are willing to experiment with various directions/options--whether "right or wrong" for the character.

- Be open, creative, and flexible.
- You might also meet with the faculty director to see what they
  might be looking for in the role. Dress for the audition and arrive
  early!
- As a new student, it is OK to perform a monologue that you already know or one that you have performed for a prior audition. You will quickly gain auditioning skills once you arrive on campus and it is best to be prepared.
- Returning students should recognize the best practices in auditioning and follow through with those practices.
- Make sure you understand how to use ZOOM for your audition submission.

For the specific requirements please read more. **REMEMBER**, monologues should **NOT** exceed 1 minute each.

**Fall auditions:** You will be auditioning for the following mainstage productions: *EAST OF THE SUN WEST OF THE MOON* and *CLUE*. Open Auditions will be online submissions: August 12 through 16th by 5:00p.m.. Callbacks are scheduled for August 18 for *EAST OF THE SUN WEST OF THE MOON* and August 19 for *CLUE*. Please prepare the following material for the OPEN AUDITION/ONLINE SUBMISSION: Two (2) contemporary contrasting monologues- one comedy and one drama. Monologues should not exceed 1-minute in length for a total of a 2-minutes. You must also prepare 16 bars of a song of your choice.

**Spring auditions will take place during the first week of classes for the semester:** Open Auditions for *SHE KILLS MONSTERS* and FEFU or other Virtual project will take place January 19-20, and callbacks are scheduled for January 21-22. The audition sign-up sheet will be posted on the Callboard in early November. Please prepare the following material: Two (2) contemporary contrasting monologues. Monologues should not exceed 1-minute in length for a total of a 2-minute audition.

## OTHER OPPORTUNITIES

In addition to the faculty directed, mainstage productions there are other opportunities for you to perform, work behind the scenes, and to make the most of your education. Here are a few of the opportunities that await you:

• The ONE ACT FESTIVAL comes from designated courses. You will need to be enrolled in the courses to perform. If you have

- technical skills, you should speak to the Design/Technical faculty about how to get involved with the projects.
- NAU Theatre Expo Theatre students present their work in design, technology, performance, and research in a juried process. This is an opportunity to showcase your undergraduate research. The venue and format will be announced later in the year, but it will take place April 14-15, 2021.
- CAPSTONE PERFORMANCES OR PROJECTS- NAU Theatre prides itself on giving each student within their major a way to solidify and test their knowledge and craftsmanship before entering the "real" world; this is known as the STUDENT SENIOR CAPSTONE PROJECT. Every graduating senior MUST complete a project within their area of interest or emphasis. Occasionally, a student director achieves the opportunity (after considerable hard work) to direct a project. There are also new plays, or other projects that create performance or "backstage" opportunities. The Capstone Projects are cast, or positions are filled after the mainstage season is staffed and cast. Although these projects are not a part of the mainstage, they are equally exciting projects and a great way for new students to be seen. Please check the CALLBOARD regularly to find other opportunities.
- TH 214 Acting Intensive is a hands-on acting course designed to give the student experience in working with an acting coach, expanding their skill set, and culminates in performing up two one-acts for the Fall One Act Festival. There are two casting periods for the course during the Emphasis auditions each spring, and during the fall open auditions for the mainstage. Students must keep their schedules open for a Tuesday/Thursday course that meets from 11:10-12:25 if they wish to be cast in the course, and students cast on the mainstage are eligible for the course and the One Act Festival.
- The NAU Theatre 24 Hour Plays (sponsored by Alpha Psi Omega the Honorary Dramatic Society) is another opportunity. In a process that normally takes months; writers, directors, stage managers and many actors write and produce individual short plays. They collaborate with staging and rehearsal before opening the doors to a live audience exactly 24 hours after the writers begin drafting their scripts. The only prep allowed prior to the weekend's festivities is the selection of participants. This event takes place between the mainstage productions during the fall semester. Please check the Callboard for details.
- Directing I Scene performances are scheduled at the end of each semester. The performances are the Directing I students' final projects. Students will present 8 to 10-minute scenes that are

fully memorized and directed. Each section of Directing I casts their work differently, so stay tuned for information on the Callboard. Directing I scenes are an excellent opportunity for freshmen and transfer students to be seen by the faculty and the students.

 Other projects such as class projects, New Works Festival, miscast event, NAUghty Bits and Creative Media and Film projects will be posted on the CALLBOARD. Remember ALWAYS CHECK THE CALLBOARD (see Department Nerve Center for details.)

#### COVID RELATED INFORMATION:

Each year, AZP also sponsors a variety of events like a night of scenes, the 10-minute play festival, the picnic auction, and more. AZP welcomes all students with an interest in theatre. There are no requirements to be a member. AZP is also the proud sponsor of NAUghty Bits, Flagstaff's premier improv comedy troupe. All students are welcome to join in and play. NAUghty Bits performs across Arizona for dorms, schools, conventions, and parties.

**United States Institute for Theatre Technology (USITT)** - NAU USITT (United States Institute for Theatre Technology) supports students looking to explore the field of design and technology. USITT provides

members with informative seminars, networking, and job opportunities. NAU USITT is under Desert State – the regional chapter – and under the National Organization. Every year USITT member attend seminar that Desert State offers, as well as the national conference. The student chapter provides financial support for students who wish to attend the National Conference.
