

### SENIORS


Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveller, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;

#### PRUNE TREES 60 ft. UP



RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PRUNING For tree Pruning, we recommend a 12 ft. Telescopi Pole which telescopes from 6 ft. to 12 ft. To this pole yo can add as many sectional 6 ft. poles as you may nee to reach up to 60 or 90 feet.

The Telescopic Poles permits you to keep the bottom and on the ground, thereby letting the ground do most of the heavy work. As you need a 6 ft. pole added to telescopic pole, all you do is slip it over the end of telescopic pole and secure it with two bolts with wing nuts. With this type of pole, an elderly man or woman comprune tail trees with ½ the elfort required with a pole that is too short, that requires holding arms over your bead

Additional 6 ft. sections are \$5.50 each plus delivery of approximately \$4.00 out of state.

You can join 6-ft. sections together for a 12. 18, 24, 30, etc. up to 42-ft. for washing windows, walls, etc.

When ordering additional attachments for poles you have to specify type and diameter of pole to assure perfect fit.






