





LOCAL WEATHER AND THE OCCURENCE OF NATURAL GRASSLAND PARKS

Natural grassland parks are found scattered throughout the ponderosa pine type of northern Arizona. These parks are of interest to the forester because there is no evidence to indicate prior existence of trees. Also, the trees surrounding the immediate border of these parks are of a poorer quality as compared to those trees found further back in the forest. These border trees are of such a poor quality that they are considered to be almost non-commercial.


The question arises, then, as to why this situation exists. The only reasonable answer seems to be that it is a result of the local weather. This study, therefore, is concerned with the local weather and its influence on the park, border and forest areas.



RECREATION USER PREFERENCES

Developed campgrounds in the northern Arizona ponderosa pine type have certain characteristics in their construction, design, location, activities available and environment which attracts different classes of recreation users. The class of recreation user found in a developed campground with the characteristics the user desires, will fit a certain pattern of age, activity, length of stay, equipment, origin, size of party, camp maintainence, and prior outdoor recreation experience. These different classes of recreation users will have different preferences as to family unit design standards. The above statements form the hypothesis of this study.

The campground inventory consists of (1) a unit inventory consisting of measuring and recording the developmental characteristics of each family unit within the campground, (2) an observation inventory which will classify the recreation users, (3) a questionnaire which will give a check on the observation inventory and determine the recreation users preferences as to family unit design.



MEASUREMENTS OF STAND DENSITY IN EVEN-AGED SECOND GROWTH PONDEROSA PINE

Many expressions of stand density have been proposed but seldom have they been tested against growth rate of trees. The purpose of this study was to compare expressions of stand density for even-aged second-growth ponderosa pine and to determine which expressions are best related to growth rate and to identify a method of determining stand density that is clear, consistent, simple, and easily applied.


Parameters of 121 stands were summarized on IBM computer data cards and analyzed by graphic and multiple-regression computations to determine stand density expressions and equations for the prediction of growth.

Multiple-regression analysis was used to determine which density expression gave the best multiple-correlation coefficient. Regressions of growth equations were repeatedly computed maintaining all variables in the equation, changing only the density expression each time.

Multiple-correlation coefficients were nearly the same for all growth equations with different density expressions with the exception of the crown-width index which was consistently lower.

The crown competition factor was the best density expression to use in predicting growth but it requires knowledge of stand parameters which are fairly difficult to obtain and to calculate.

The tree area ratio and basal area are recognized as dependable density expressions in predicting growth because they are clear, consistent, and easy to calculate from parameters which are simple to measure. Growth equations containing the tree area ratio or basal area had slightly lower multiple correlation coefficents than equations with other expressions but these two expressions were much easier to determine.
