

DEAN'S REPORT




As another year nears completion we look back on the decade of the 60's and ahead to the 70's.

Our activities over the past years have been formative and imitative as we developed the School, the traditions, and the curriculum following the pattern of most U.S. forestry schools. In practically all areas, our progress has been quite conventional.

Looking to the future, I hope we are about to break out of the mold. Our two years of work on an integrated, unstructured forestry curriculum may be the first step. We are convinced of the need for a U. S. forestry school that will concentrate on undergraduate education -- relevant, current, challenging undergraduate education. We are trying to steer N.A.U. forestry away from the usual emphasis on graduate students, research, grants, lecture sections with 200 students, instruction in little compartments, and all of the problems that the undergraduate finds so frustrating.

Alums, come by in a couple of years, and see what the 70's hold for forestry!
