He also taught high school students for a period before enrolling at Colorado State University to pursue his doctorate degree in Wood Technology and Utilization.

Well known for his expertise in the field, he is frequently asked for his professional opinion. His most interesting instances were his participation as an expert witness of wood identification in a homicide case and the discovery of termites as the main culprit in the deterioration of the original President's house on campus. 




MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN





NATIVE AMERICAN PROGRAM




CONCLAVE - SAN LUIS OBISPO
