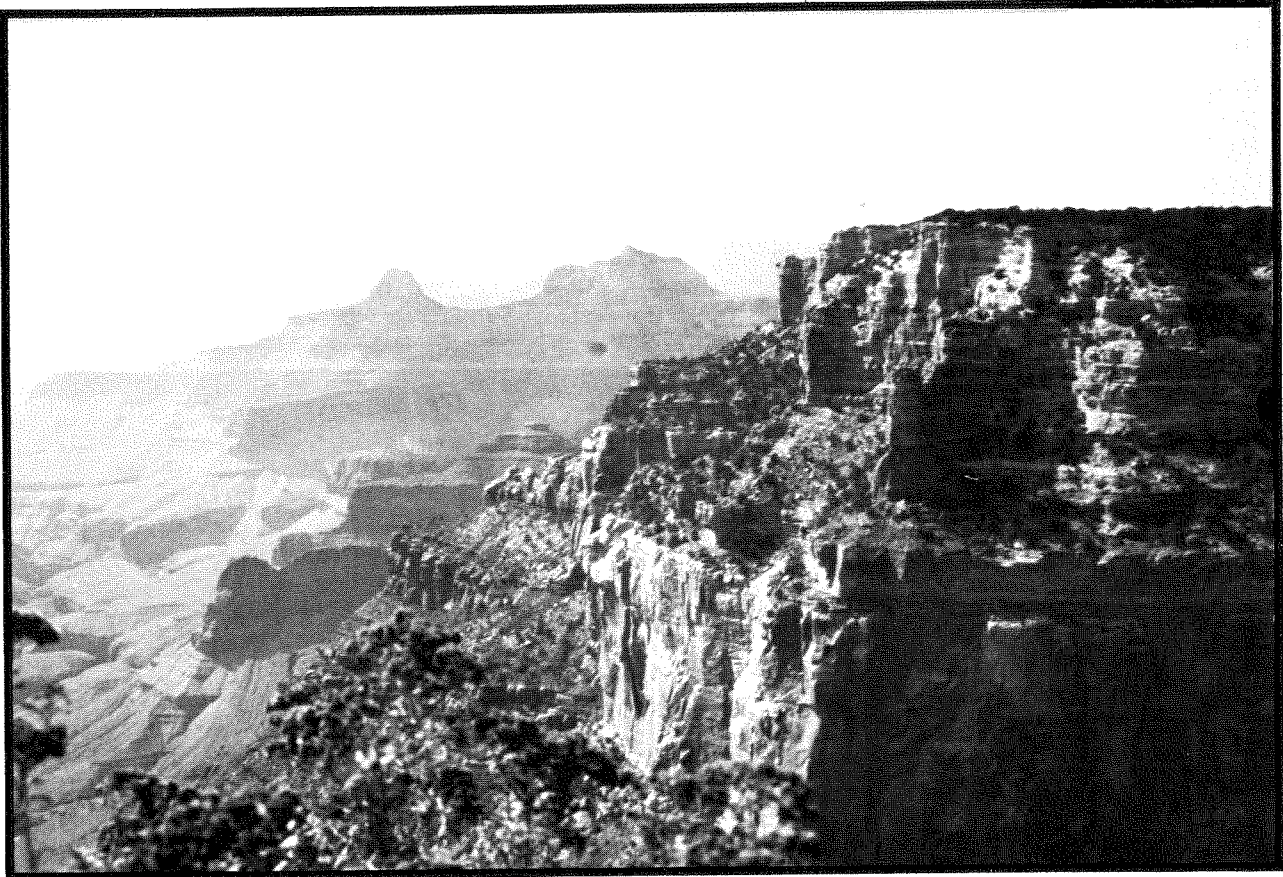

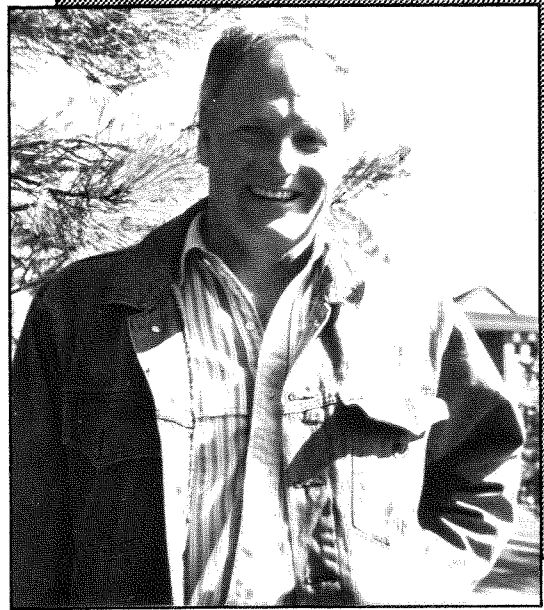

A MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

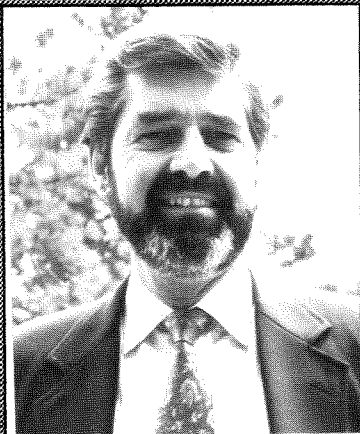
Each year I am astounded at the growth in problems associated with resource management. I now have enough years and wisdom to know that the battle for resolution must continue, and with ever more diligence.

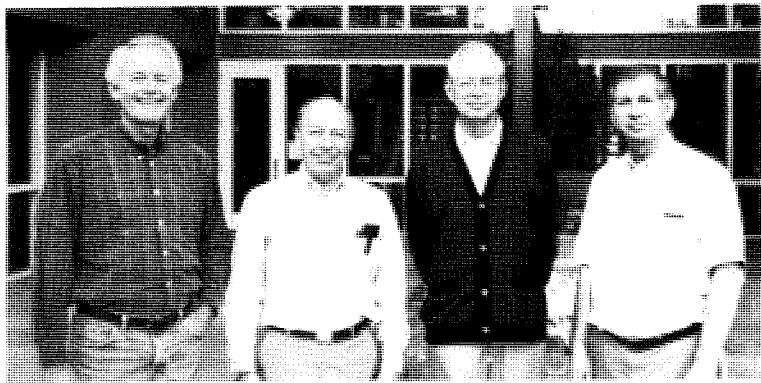
Dean L. David Garrett

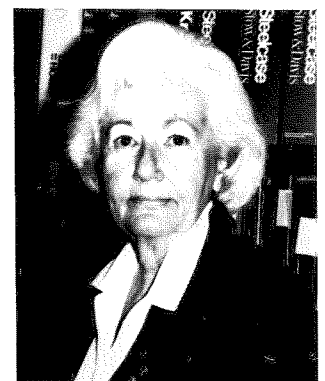


Mrs. Gisela McCormick

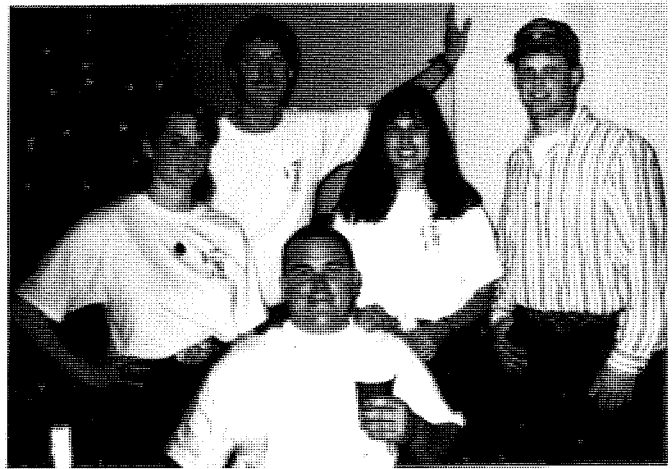
CONCLAVE--CORVALLIS, OREGON

SOCIETY OF AMERICAN FORESTERS

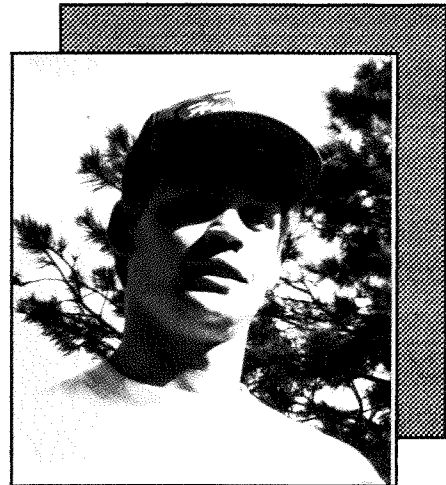
Student Chapter

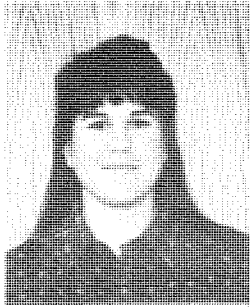

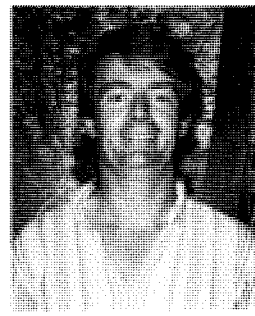

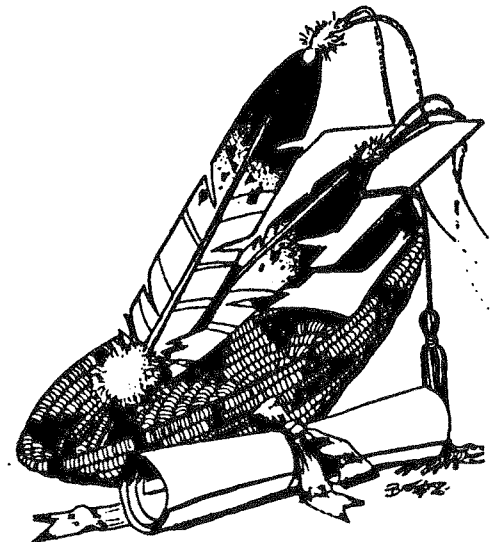

The Native American Forestry Program at Northern Arizona University supports the academic and personal growth of Native American forestry majors.

This program not only helps students achieve their academic goals, it also provides support services and referrals for students and their families. It addresses issues of cultural difference for students and faculty, since differences in culture may affect a student's ability to succeed at NAU. The program establishes direct lines of contact between students and their families and the School of Forestry faculty members. The program also involves Native American forestry professionals with bachelor's and master's degrees as role-model mentors and advisors.

The program's goals are to increase the number of Native Americans graduating with bachelor's degrees and to encourage students to pursue graduate study.

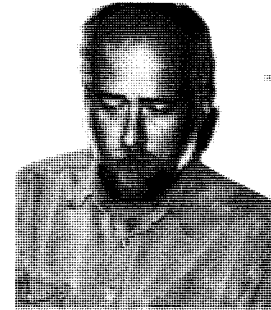
The Native American Forestry Program has retained a dedicated staff since its inception in 1989. Dr. Ronald L. Trosper, a member of the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes of the Flathead Indian Reservation in Montana, serves as program director. He is assisted by Randy P. Roberts, program coordinator and a member of the Navajo Nation of New Mexico, and Chris Atine, student advocate and member of the Navajo Nation in Utah.



NEW FACULTY

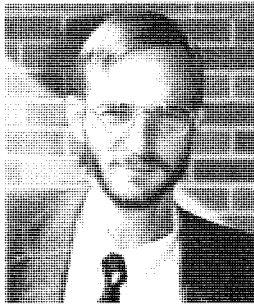
Dr. Paul Beier

Dr. Richard W. Behan

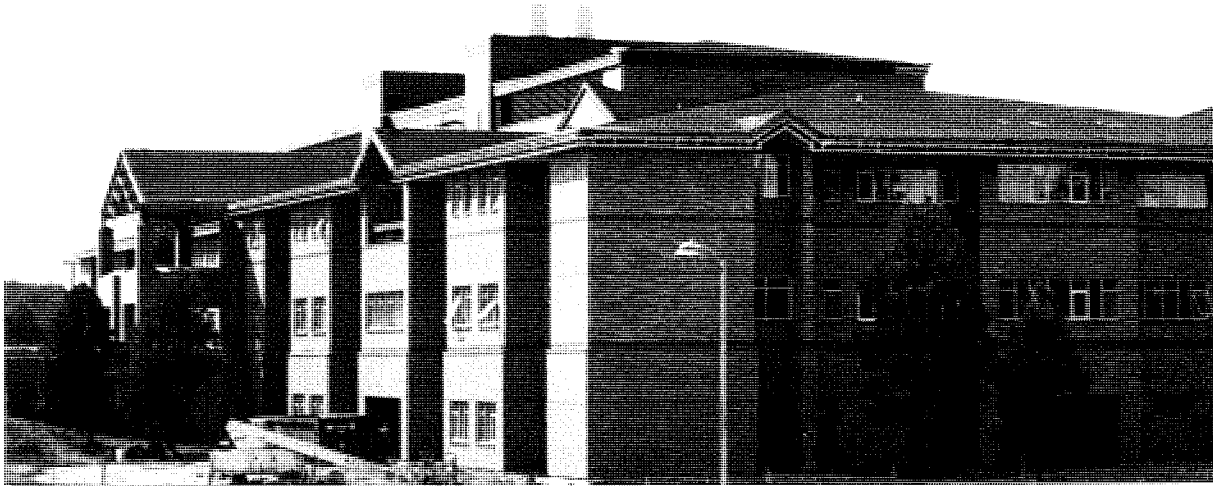

OUR NEW HOME



The Southwest Forestry Sciences Complex was conceived in 1990. The idea was a response to concern by Senior Senator Dennis DeConcini that the issues of forest management in the Southwest were not sufficiently being addressed and should call for a directed scientific research effort. The facility was designed to foster a partnership between the N.A.U. School of Forestry and the U.S.F.S. Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station. The purpose of the partnership is to conduct scientific research in ecology based multi-use forest management and also to bring the research to the classrooms (both graduate and undergraduate) and to forest managers and policy makers in the Southwest.

The S.W.F.S.C. is a multilevel building encompassing 120,000 square feet and containing faculty and research staff offices, as well as research, teaching, and computer laboratories, classrooms, and lecture halls. One side of the complex lodges the operations of the Arizona Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station, and the other side houses the N.A.U. School of Forestry, with both wings joined by a common, two-story atrium and lobby.

The complex, built primarily with federally appropriated funds, was something to behold from afar. We found, however, that having a new building is not so satisfying as one imagines. Our first weeks as students in the new Complex were trying ones as we had to attend classes while the "kinks" were being worked out (i.e. classrooms with heaters gone haywire and stuffy rooms). The walls deafly received our curses. Little by little however, the building grew on us and now we consider it our "home away from home." I have seen my peers actively defend their territory within the once cursed walls. My friends, we've come home.

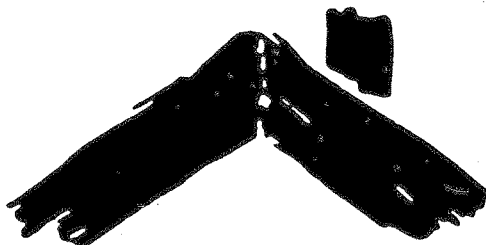


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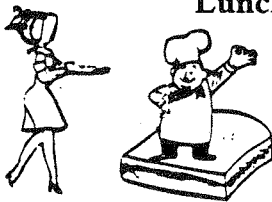
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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:

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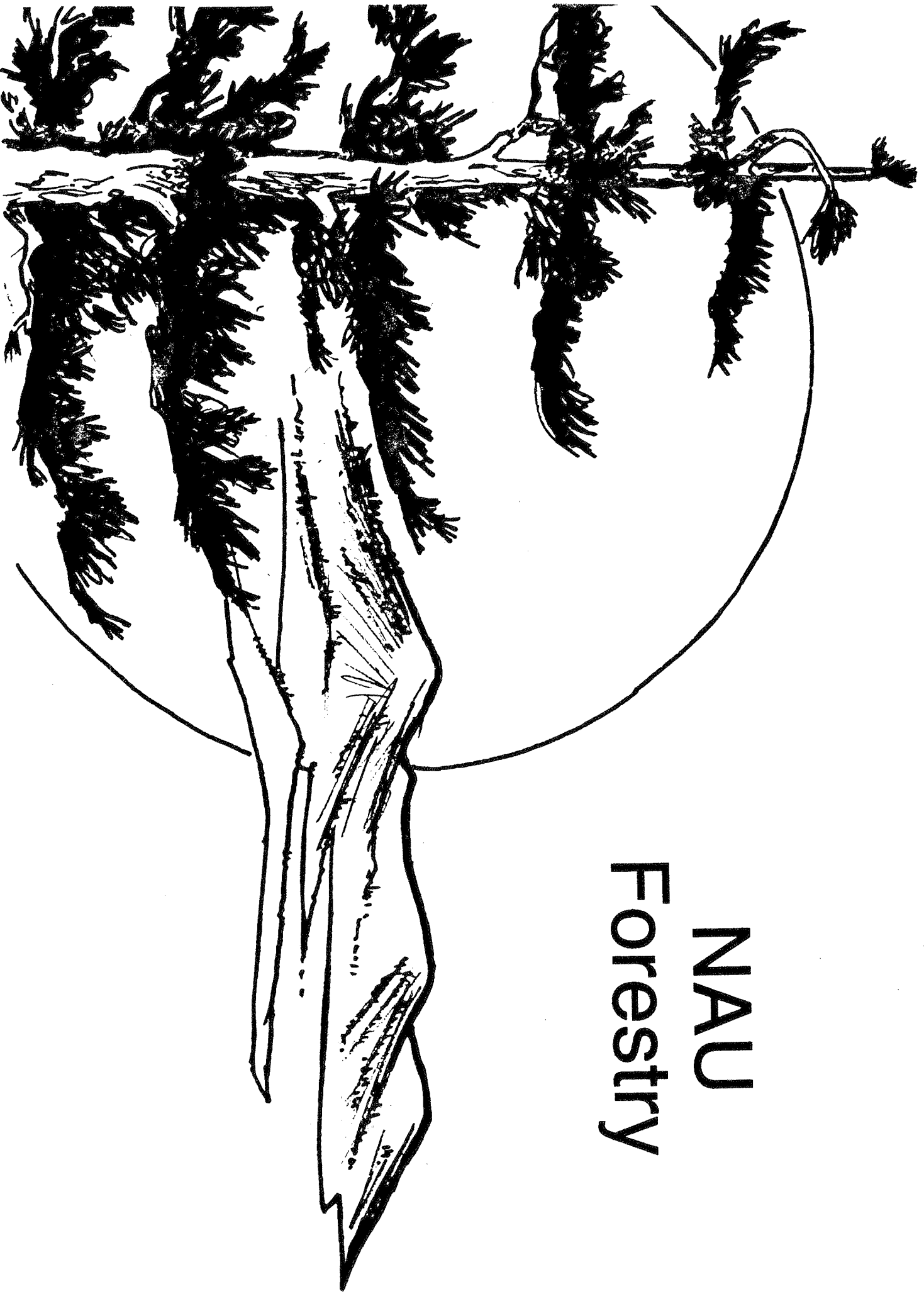
